to make collections of historical interest and to insure the continuous adequate care of such collections and their accessibility to the general public;


to interest and unite the people of Marlborough and promote a fuller understanding of its traditions and history.

Jim Hollister, Interpretive Park Ranger at Minuteman National Historical Park in Concord will present ***Beyond the Minuteman*** - Exploring the Military Tradition of the Massachusetts Militia. From the stern Puritan warriors of the 17th century, to the audacious "**minute men**" of Revolutionary fame, the citizen-soldiers of the Massachusetts Militia played a crucial role in the building of our nation. First organized in the 1630's, the Massachusetts Militia successfully defended their colony for more than 140 years prior to the Revolution. Join Park Ranger Jim Hollister (wearing 18th century period clothing and weapons) for a one hour exploration of the Old World origins and New World adaptations of the Massachusetts militia, their equipment and weapons, the many threats they faced and the impact of this military tradition on the events of April 19, 1775.

Did marriages in Colonial times require a license, witness and a ceremony as they do today? What state had an 1843 law stating that all that was necessary was for the parties to declare, "that they take each other as husband and wife?" How *common* were common-law marriages? Come and

find out the answers to these questions and more when John Lambert of Marlborough presents ***Marriage Through the Years***, a history of marriage from the ancient Greek and Roman days through the Colonial period, to the present day.
